FACILITIES & SENIOR STUDIOS

PCAGD's state-of-the-art studios, labs, and resources provide students and faculty with access to a variety of creative learning environments. PCA&D's facilities are outfitted with the latest industry-standard equipment, as well as large teaching studios for students working in more traditional media. The college's Suzanne H. and Ronald D. Schrotberger Design Center supports students and faculty as they integrate digital technologies into their learning, teaching, and professional lives. Students from all majors connect their creative energies in one dynamic environment. In addition to well-equipped classroom space, the college offers gallery space for hosting exhibitions by regional and national artists and areas to display current student artwork. PCA&D's library features a wealth of current resources to facilitate research and creativity. Several student lounges in the college buildings are available for studying, socializing, and exchanging ideas outside of the classroom.

All PCA&D students are provided individual studio space in their senior year. Grouped alongside other senior studios, this environment fosters collaboration and teamwork. You'll find yourself actively engaged in the processes of concept and critique with your classmates and faculty as you hone your abilities to execute complex visual solutions.



BACHELOR OF FINE ARTS DEGREE PROGRAMS

The BFA is the desired professional degree for artists and designers. PCA&D offers the Bachelor of Fine Arts degree in digital media, fine art, graphic design, illustration, and photography. You will spend the first year in foundation, building a solid set of art and design skills and concepts. At the end of foundation year, you will choose your major. You will go on to experience intensive work in the visual arts and share ideas and resources with students in all the majors. Getting to work directly with real clients is an extremely valuable and meaningful experience for students. PCA&D illustration majors regularly compete to produce projects for clients, giving them the opportunity to create published, professional portfolio pieces while they are still in college. Illustration students are required to participate in an internship and complete courses in business practices and portfolio preparation to teach them what they need to know about effective self-promotion, finding clients, pricing, and ethical guidelines, along with how to manage their business, whether it be as a small independent contractor or working for a major studio. LIBERAL ARTS

The liberal arts curriculum is an important component of your education. These classes build critical-thinking skills and examine the creative process in *a wide range of subjects*. Through your four years of liberal arts coursework, you will learn effective writing, research, and analysis skills and establish the framework to think globally. ADMISSION CHECKLIST BEA PROGRAM: FOR STUDENTS WHO ARE FULL-TIME OR PART-TIME, FIRST-TIME OR TRANSFER

APPLICATION FEE: Complete an application for admission and return it to the admission office accompanied by the \$40 application fee (\$110 for international applicants). The application fee is non-refundable. Start your application online at *pcad.edu/BFAapply*.

- **TRANSCRIPTS:** An official high school transcript is required of all applicants. Transfer students must also submit transcripts from all completed college coursework along with course descriptions in addition to their high school transcript.
- □ **PORTFOLIO REVIEW:** Students should submit 10 15 pieces of recent, original artwork, including a minimum of three pieces from direct observation. Students are encouraged to submit their portfolios in-person, but digital submission options are available. Applicants may request additional portfolio preparation information from the admission department.
- **PERSONAL STATEMENT:** All applicants are required to submit a 250 500 word, typed personal statement that describes your reasons for choosing a visual arts education, any influences that led to this choice, visual art experiences you have had in and outside of the classroom, any involvement in clubs or jobs, and your current career goals. In the personal statement, we are looking for an expression of your passion and commitment to art. Applicants should list their full name and mailing address on the statement. The statement may be printed and mailed or emailed to the admission department.
- **RECOMMENDATIONS:** Two recommendation forms are required for students who have a cumulative GPA below 2.5. One form must be completed by a guidance counselor or a teacher in an academic discipline; the other form must be completed by a studio art instructor. Contact the admission department or visit our website for a downloadable PDF of our form.
- **TEST SCORES:** SAT or ACT scores are not a requirement for admission to PCA&D, but students are strongly encouraged to submit them with their application. Our College Board code is 2681 and our ACT code is 3569.
- □ INTERVIEW: Students are strongly encouraged to have a personal interview with their admissions counselor. The interview enables the college to assess each applicant's artistic background, intent, level of commitment, and ability to benefit from advanced study in the arts.
