

## Returning? Remember today's FAFSA deadline

A message from Director of Financial Aid & Student Employment Vincent Frank:

This is a friendly reminder that the deadline for Pennsylvania residents to apply for Financial Aid for the 2025-26 school year is TODAY, May 1. If you have not already done this, please do so immediately at <a href="mailto:studentaid.gov">studentaid.gov</a>.

This is especially urgent for Pennsylvania residents because the FAFSA must be submitted by May 1 in order to be considered for the Pennsylvania State Grant. The PA State Grant is worth up to \$5,750, which is free money that does not need to be repaid. If you complete the FAFSA \*after\* May 1, you will automatically be ineligible for the PA State Grant for the entire 2025-26 academic year.

If you do not receive the PA State Grant as a result of missing the filing deadline, please be aware that PCA&D will be unable to replace it with institutional grants.

Several states and U.S. territories (including Delaware, Ohio, West Virginia, Washington, D.C., and Vermont) have reciprocity with Pennsylvania, meaning their state grants may be used at Pennsylvania schools. If you reside in one of those locations, you will need to check with the grant agency for your state or territory for deadlines and other details.

## New grant program for Pennsylvania residents

The Pennsylvania Higher Education Assistance Agency (PHEAA) is administering a new grant program for Pennsylvania residents called the Grow PA Scholarship Grant Program. It provides up to \$5,000 annually in grants to those who participate in one of over 460 majors.

There are numerous caveats, including a requirement to work in Pennsylvania after graduation in an "in-demand occupation" for as many years as the grant is received; if that is not met, then the grant will retroactively turn into a loan that must be repaid to PHEAA.

## Atrium renovations get underway this month

In just a week, renovations to the College's Atrium space get underway!

Until mid-August, we'll be undertaking a major (and long-awaited!) Atrium refresh under the design guidance of Tippetts/Weaver Architects, and the management of Benchmark Construction. A few highlights: reimagining the current stairwell to the Mezzanine level to include a seating wall; the addition of two new "social pods" for students to meet up at the top of the stairs; the inclusion of retractable hanging scrims that may be used to separate parts of the Atrium or as projection screens to animate the space; and new flooring. It's a big change from the current space, and we're excited to see how our student body enlivens the space when classes get started again this August! As I see it, there are four key problems affected by four factors to address in our industry: the lack of talent to support the industry, the lack of uniformity in skill sets, lack of uniformity in finding and support, and too many siloed groups working out of sync.

#### Too many siloed grou

Our industry developed organically, serving many different audiences and stakeholders across the globe, but as shows move from regional productions to worldwide tours, standardization is paramount so that we all can share a common technical language, even when we don't share a native tongue. When we are in silos, our initiatives can work age each other and are especially confusing toyoung workforce without enough handsexperience to be discerning. We can tend toward tribalism in our own clubs of people on tour or at industry events. While this ca serve to build camaraderic and belonging during a production, it doesn't serve as a welcoming model for those hoping to breal into the industry.

To combat these problems, I see six solution that can change this dynamic:

- Entry-level and intermediate student education: We need to engage the great resources and training facilities that alread; exist and coordinate and collaborate for a more unified set of career cluster frame-
- Wurkplace on-ramping: We need to codify shear value on programs, per apprentice-thips and apprentice-thips to ensure we continue to lave great on the-job training resort some continues.
