



## Get ready for a new, more inviting Atrium!

In just a week, renovations to the College's Atrium space get underway!

Until mid-August, we'll be undertaking a major (and long-awaited!) Atrium refresh under the design guidance of Tippetts/Weaver Architects, and the management of Benchmark Construction. A few highlights: reimagining the current stairwell to the Mezzanine level to include a seating wall; the addition of two new "social pods" for students to meet up at the top of the stairs; the inclusion of retractable hanging scrims that may be used to separate parts of the Atrium or as projection screens to animate the space; and new flooring. It's a big change from the current space, and we're excited to see how our student body enlivens the space when classes get started again this August! The worldwide work stoppage in the industry during the pandemic broke this model, resulting in master attrition as weekers retired or transitioned into other industries. We saw more than a hird of our most stilled takent leave and never come back, which resulted in losing that brasin trust of mentorship. The pandemic years also revealed problems in our industry that can no longer be ignored as our industry matures as a professional career pathway.

As I see it, there are tour key problems affected by four factors to address in our industry: the lack of talent to support the industry, the lack of uniformity in skill sets, lack of uniformity in funding and support, and too many siloed groups working out of sync.

#### Lack of talent to

As an industry, we have a mishmash of training programs that leave it to each individual employer to outline what skills are required

The training model of the International Alliance of Theurical and Stage Imployees (IATSE) union is robust, as are many large private employers, however, only the members or employees of each organization can attend these trainings and, as a result, they are silored, Universal standards and certifications are needed to professionalize our industry.

Three years ago, Jim Digby and I hosted the Creative Industry Roundtable. Instead of one leader attempting to speak on behalf of the whole event industry. we flipped that model to host a table of key industry influencers that as a body represented all the stakeholders. Each year, the group selects the most important and timely effort to put their collective support behind. In 2024, that effort was workforce de velopment. The result was to rally in support of the EEWDF (Events Education Workforce Development Federation) with Laura Paliser and her initiative to update the NAICS codes ONET codes, and a career cluster framework that would benefit everyone across the entire

This doesn't mean that we need one entity to rule them all because frankly, we are an industry of creatives who tend to recoil at the idea of centralized authority. #### Too many siloed grou working out of sync

Our industry developed organically, serving many different audiences and stakeholders across the globe, but as shows move from regional productions to worldwisde tours, standardization is paramount so that we all can share a common technical language, eve when we don't share a native tongue. When we are in silos, our initiatives can work again each other and are especially confusing to a or experience to be discerning. We can tend one experience to be discerning. We can tend toward tribalism in our own clubs of people on tour or at industry events. While this can serve to build camazaderie and belonging during a production, it doesn't serve as a welcoming model for those hoping to break into the industry.

To combat these problems, I see six solution that can change this dynamic:


